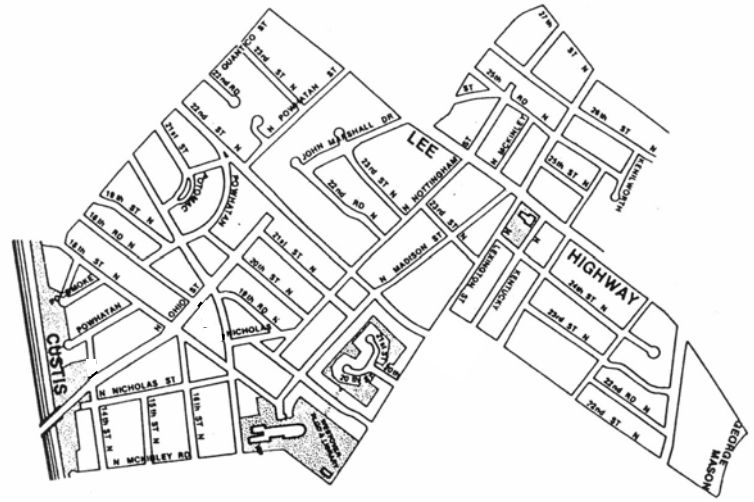

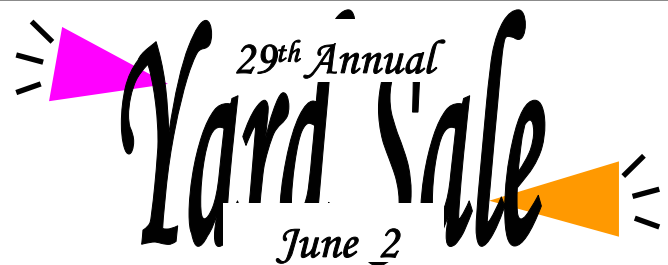

Two Neighborhood Items To Be Discussed at Meeting

There will be a double-header presentation at the civic association's April 24th meeting. The County has initiated an inventory of needed/desired neighborhood capital improvements. This will help local officials size the biannual bond approved by the voters for projects to improve their local neighborhoods. Tim McIntosh will explain to local residents how they can help identify needed improvements to streets and other public property within the Leeway Overlee area.

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is pushing ahead with its plans for so-called spot improvements to I-66 in Arlington. Arlington Citizens for Sensible Transportation (ACST) has long opposed VDOT's plan as a backdoor effort to widen I-66 to six lanes of traffic. Allen Muchnick will explain how a "wiser not wider" interstate adjacent to our neighborhood is the correct solution. Learn what you can do to influence what ultimately happens in the I-66 corridor.



The 29th annual Leeway Overlee Community Day and Yard Sale will take place along the John Marshall Drive/Ohio Street greenway on Saturday, June 2nd from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. The community will be out in force to exchange information and greetings, sell unneeded household items, and pick up a few bargains. The civic association will again work to arrange live music for this community gathering.

Over 100 families set up tables for the festivities, which take place along the greenway between Lee Highway and Washington Boulevard. Vehicle traffic will be restricted on the affected parts of N. Ohio Street during the event. Residents who have not sold in the past are encouraged to set up between Lee Highway and N. 22nd Road. Please show consideration to nearby residents and do not set up before 7:00 a.m. The sale will be advertised in *The Washington Post*.

During the event a civic association representative will come by to collect \$5.00 from each seller to help defray the costs of the newspaper advertisement and the entertainment. Be considerate of neighborhood residents when parking for the yard sale. Ensure that all goods and rubbish are removed by 1 p.m. Rain date is Saturday, June 9.

Please leave your dogs at home. The civic association has received complaints about situations that arise due to the presence of pets in the crowd.

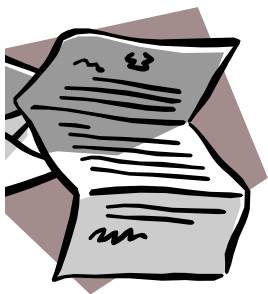
Nominating Committee Seeks Officer Candidates

WAVA Tower Is Coming Down

The controversial transmission tower close to the Post Office on N. George Mason Drive will soon come down. Civic association officers and local residents have met several times with the tower's owners. The owners wished to replace the current tall, thin tower with a new structure and keep their broadcasting clients. Irate neighbors (and the civic association) made it clear that they would strenuously oppose the use permit request



unless the owners solved the signal interference problems that have existed for years. People complained of getting unwanted radio broadcasts on their stereo systems and TVs. Others living near the tower found that their garage openers and other home

electronics would not function properly.

The tower owners drafted a mitigation plan to address these problems, but they recently cancelled the next planned meeting with civic representatives. A court order has been issued in a separate suit that requires the tower to come down within 60 days. The tower owners have since withdrawn their use permit request for a new tower. That request was scheduled to be heard by the County Board later this month.

The client radio stations, which include WAVA FM and AM, are expected to migrate to other existing towers in Arlington.

School Board Approves New Westover Library, Reed School

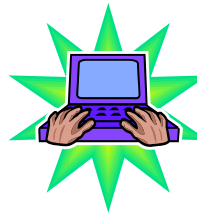
The Arlington School Board endorsed the design for construction of a new Westover Branch Library and a new Reed School on school property near the corner of N. McKinley Road and Washington Boulevard at its March meeting. The façade of the old Reed School will be retained as the front of the new library.

The new library will be triple the size of the existing facility a block away. The School Board added additional funds to the project to ensure that the new school building would be "green" and could support the addition of an extra floor in the future should the Board wish to reestablish Reed as an elementary school.

Thanks to the Volunteer Snowmen

The community has once again made it through the winter without a crippling snowfall—in large measure due to the vigilance and quick action of our Volunteer Snowmen. They responded promptly to the one significant snowfall in February and cleaned many of the public sidewalks, especially those running to the East Falls Church Metro station. Residential Brush Pickup

The County will pick up tree and bush trimmings that you collect this spring—but **only if you request a specific pickup**. Place the brush curbside and call the Solid Waste Division at (703) 228-6570 on weekdays 8 am - 5 pm or request a pickup online by going to the County web site (<http://www.arlingtonva.us/>) and click “Recycling” under Environment in the topics list. Follow County guidelines for preparing brush for pickup. If someone else’s pile of brush has been “decorating” your street for several weeks, take the initiative to call it in for pickup!

Westover High Rise Building Plan Abandoned

The effort of AHC, Inc. to replace some of the World War II era garden apartments near the Westover shopping center with a high rise building has come to naught. The developer was unable to secure favorable financing for the project. Several local civic associations including Leeway Overlee held meetings with the developer to express the concerns of the community. While the number of “affordable” dwelling units would have increased, there would have been more vehicle traffic and changes to neighborhood appearance. AHC will instead refurbish its existing 152 apartments on the block.
